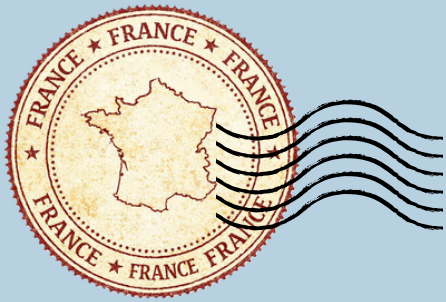

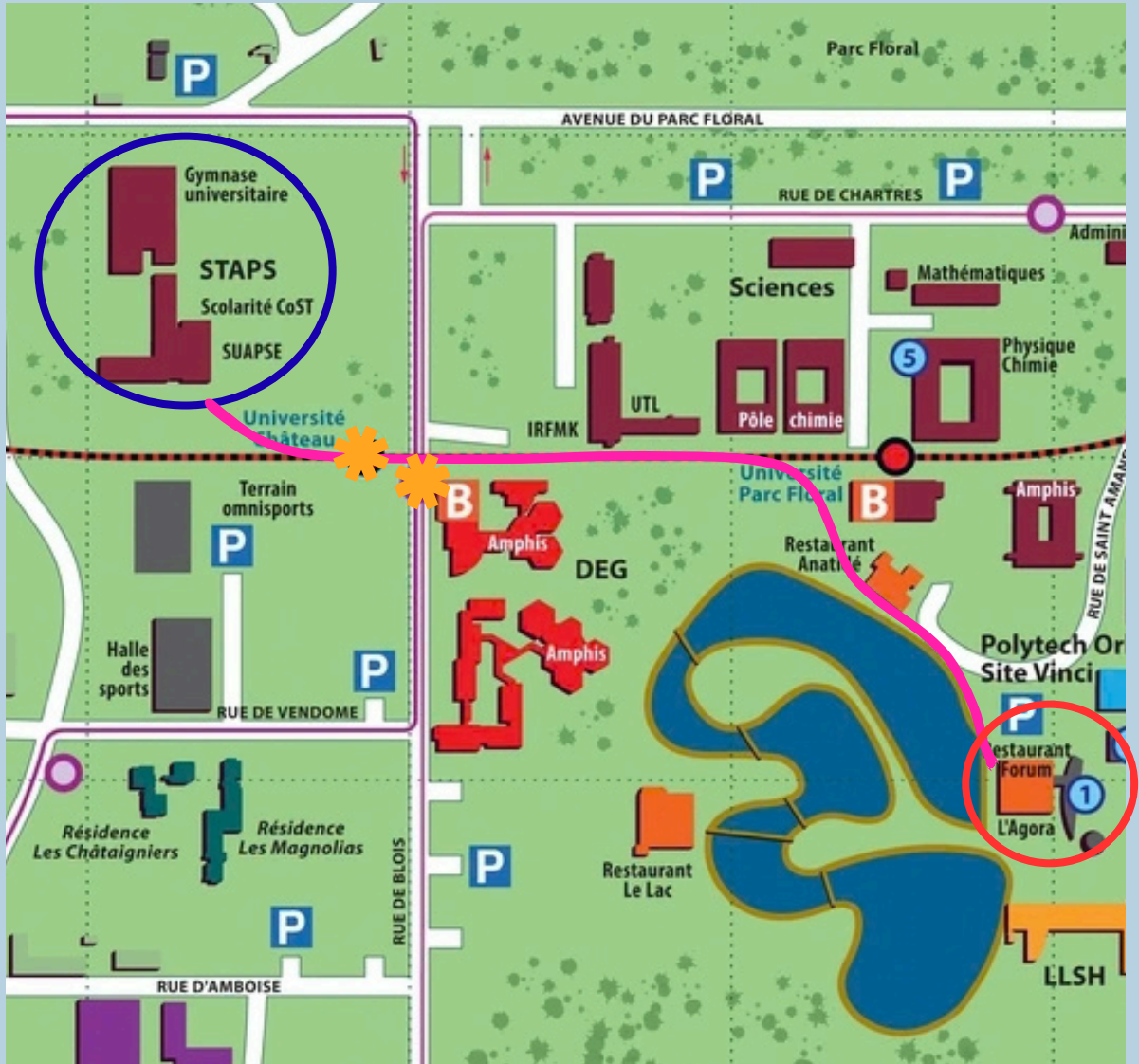

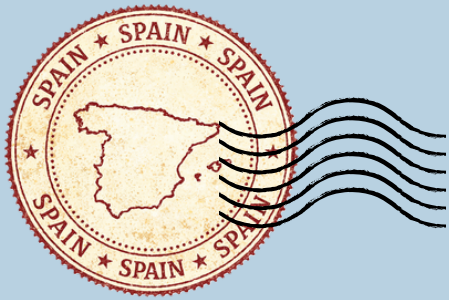

# Activity

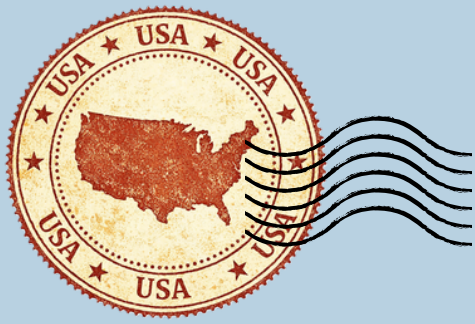
During the conference, if you have some time, we invite you to take a walk in the Parc Floral.

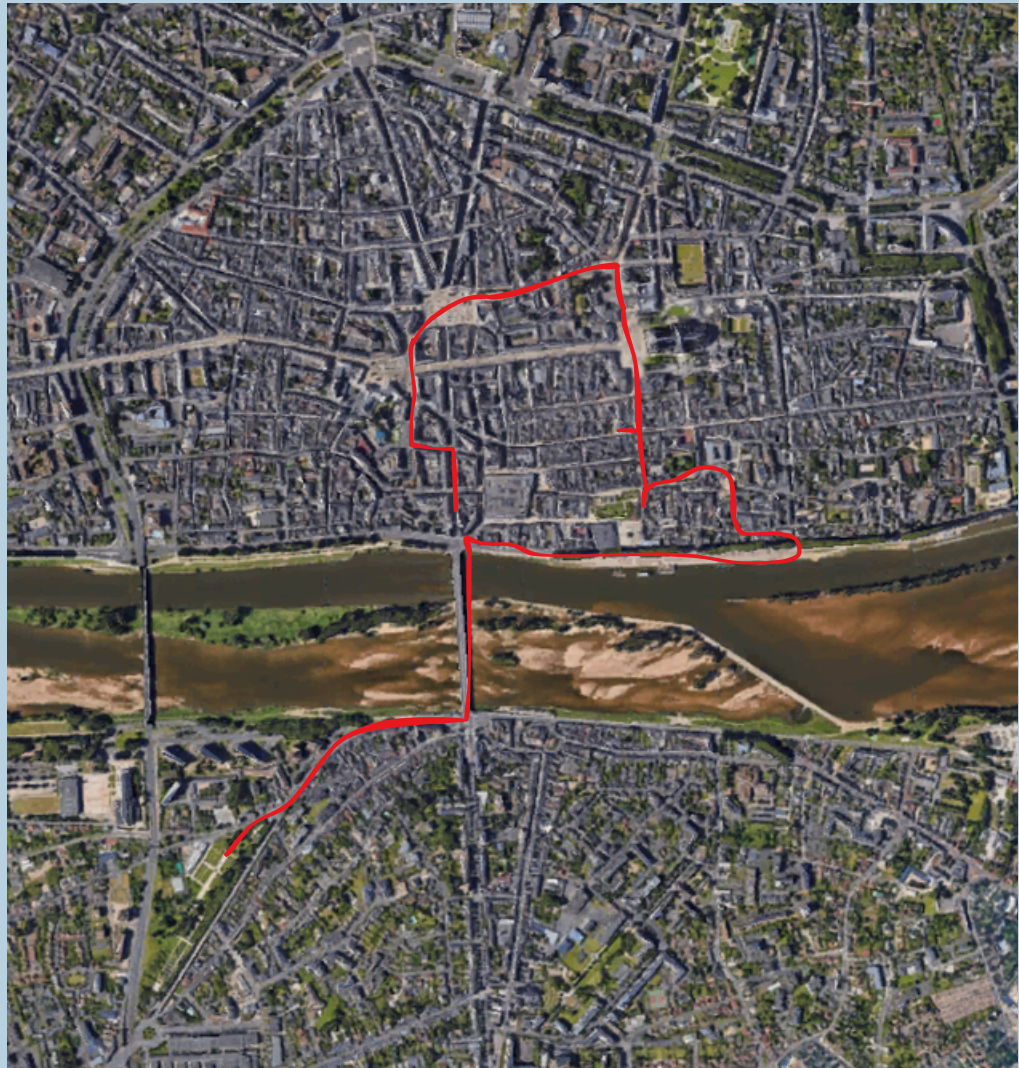


# Cultural programme

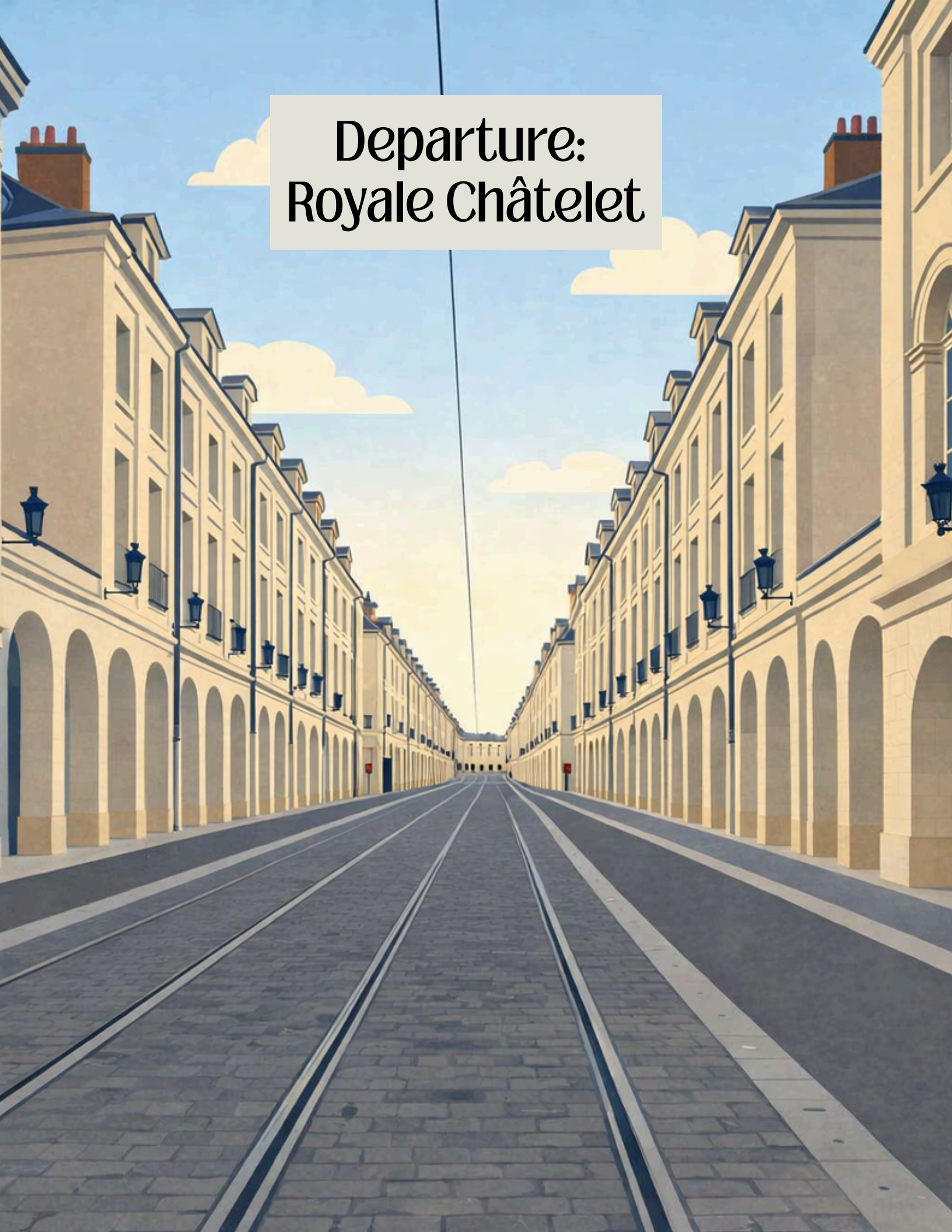
Welcome to the visit of Orleans in which you'll see most of the city. The map of Orleans will help you navigate the city without getting lost (at least, we hope so!).

You're going for a 5km walk, namely a 1h30 stroll



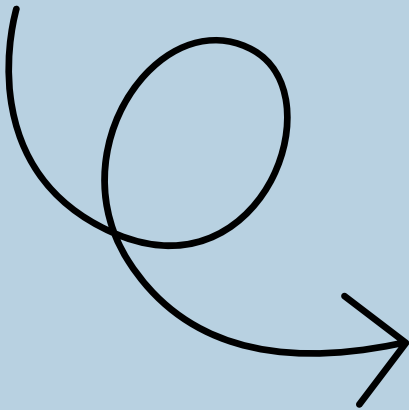

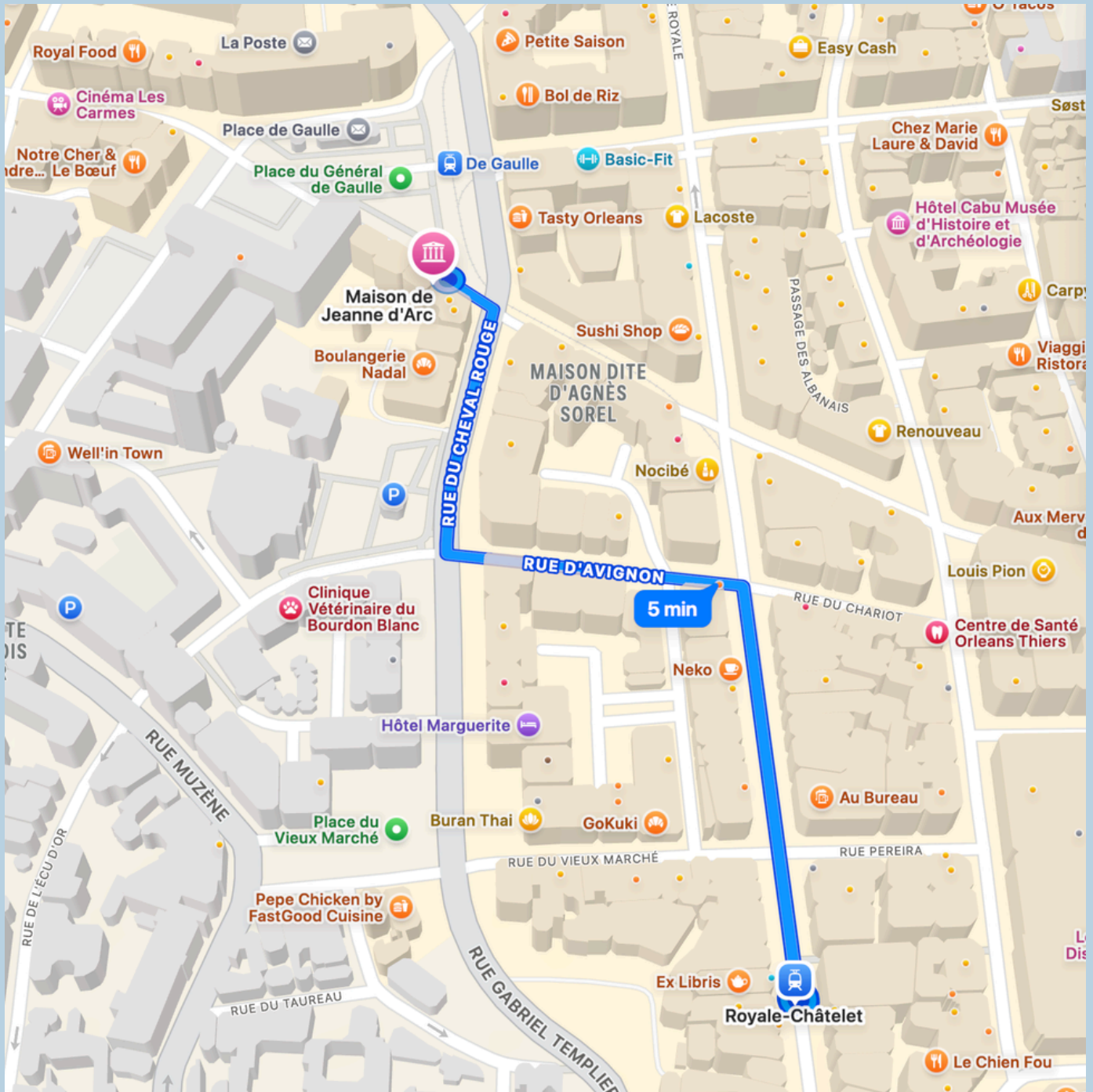
## Departure: Royale Châtelet

This street stands out for its arcades and symmetrical pavilions, some of which date back to the 18th century. Be sure to admire them on your way to the next step: Maison Jeanne d'Arc.

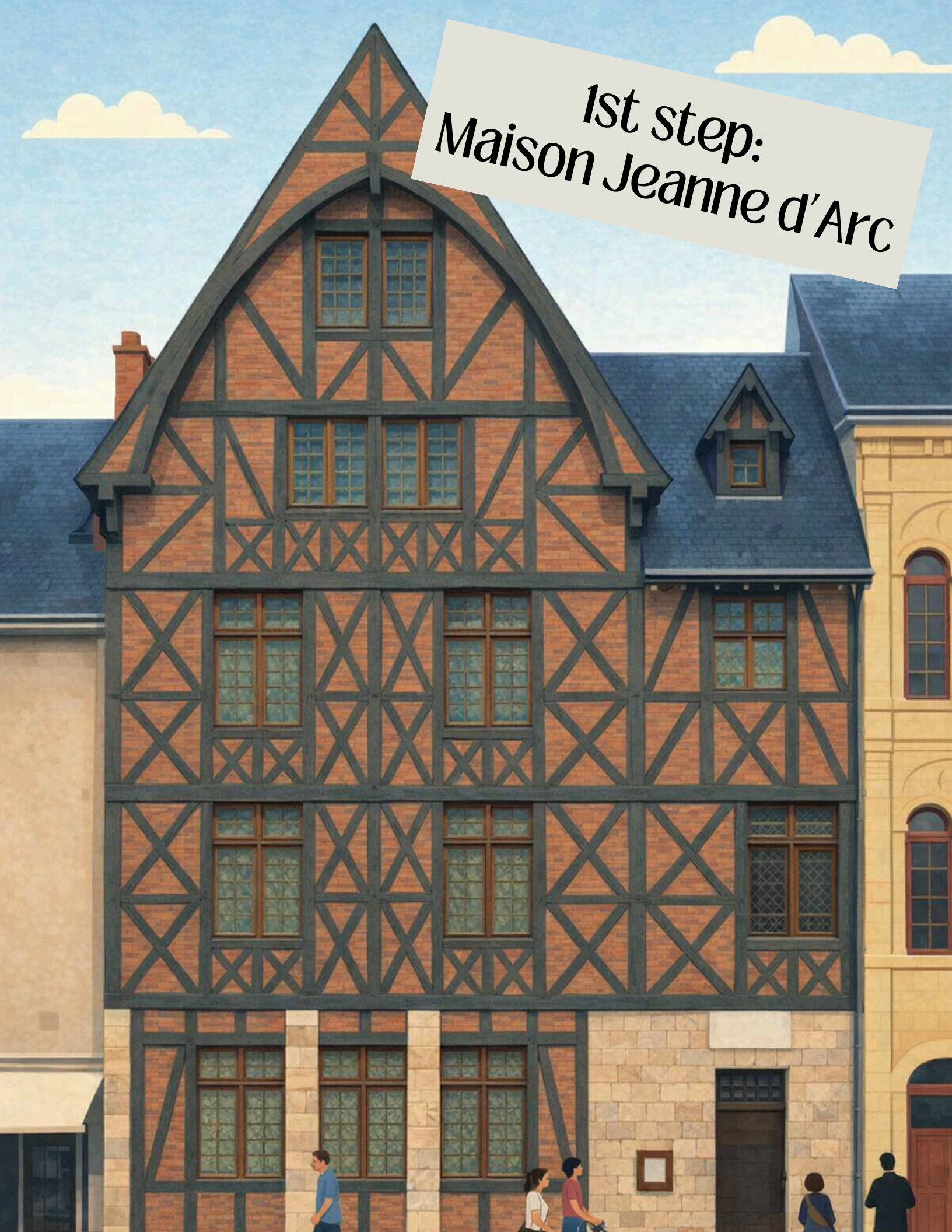

## 1st step: Maison Jeanne d'Arc

The Maison de Jeanne d'Arc is a 1960s reconstitution of the house of Jacques Boucher, treasurer of the Duke of Orleans. It was the place where Jeanne d'Arc stayed during the English siege, from April 29 to May 9, 1429, during the siege of Orleans in the Hundred Years' War (1337-1453).

## 2nd step: Martroi Square

“Martroy” comes from the Latin “Martyrium” and refers to the place where condemned prisoners were executed. Nevertheless, we don’t know if the name comes from the numerous executions that took place there or to the ancient Gallo-Roman cemetery.

This square was integrated to the city in the 14th century. During the 18th century, the square expanded based on Galley’s plans, the King’s building inspector in Orléans. The first structure of this project was the Maison de la Chancellerie which is now the restaurant **La Chancellerie**.

The place du Martroi is the main square of Orléans, marked by the equestrian statue of Jeanne d’Arc, unveiled on May 8, 1855. The statue was made by Foyatier, a sculptor, and depicts Jeanne d’Arc giving thanks to God.

## 3rd step: Hotel Groslot

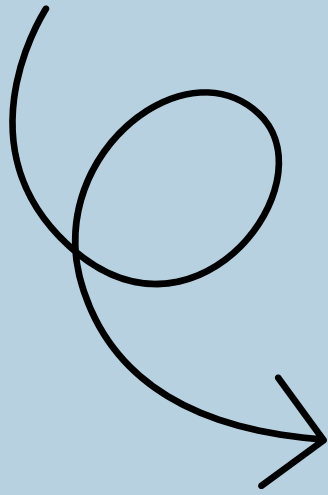
Near the Cathedral is situated the Hotel Groslot. It was built for Bailli Jacques Groslot between 1549 and 1558. It served as a residence for the French kings François II and Charles IX, as well as the regent Catherine de Médicis. It was then used as Orléans' City Hall from 1790 to 1981. Its interior was restored by the architect Delton in 1850, and the building was listed as a Historical Monument in 1862.

Behind the beautiful red brick frontage, you'll discover the story of this private residence transformed through time into a "town hall": first through the main hall, then the former council chamber and the former mayor's office, and finally, the wedding hall where Francis II died, having come to preside over the Estates General of 1560 with his mother, Catherine de Médicis.

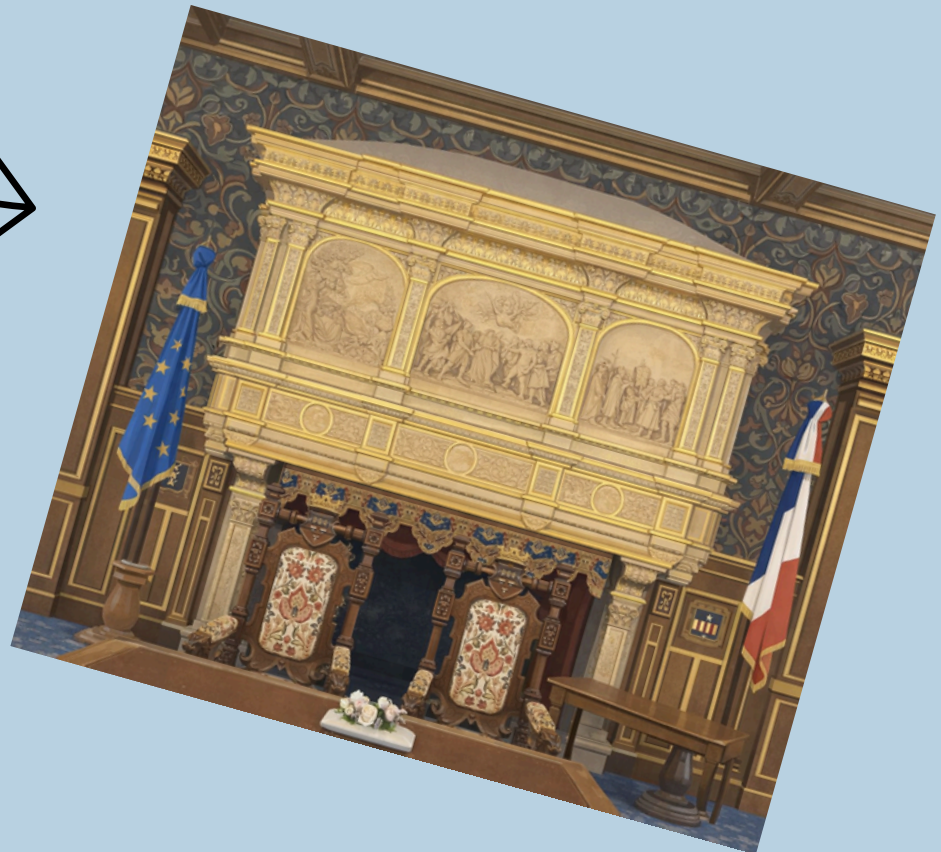


## 3rd step: Hotel Groslot

A large bronze statue of Jeanne d'Arc, commissioned by Princess Marie d'Orléans, overlooks this vast Renaissance monument. Its distinctive red brick frontage, rich furnishings, and Aubusson tapestries make it a fascinating residence to explore.

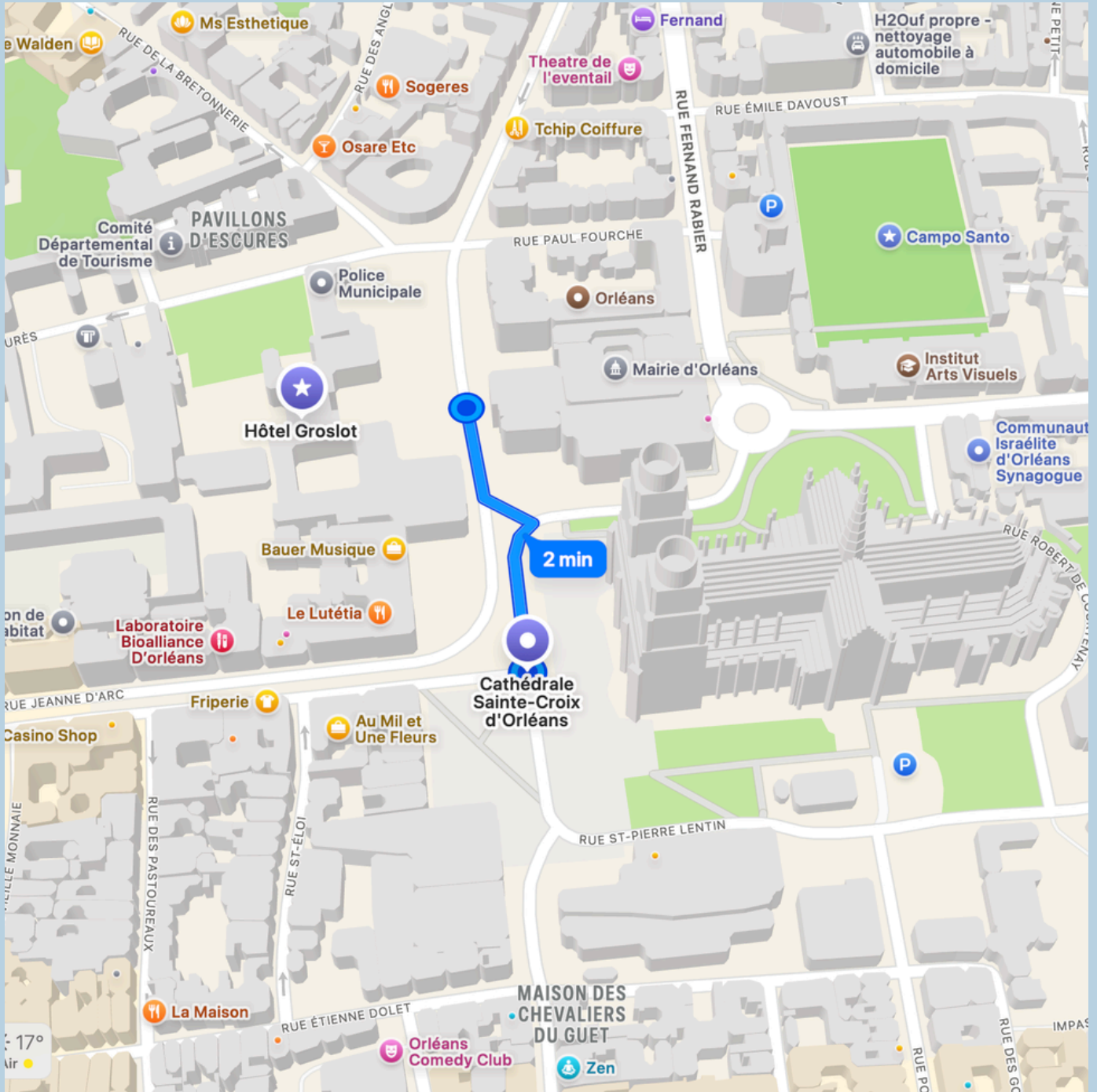

## 4th step: Sainte-Croix Cathedral

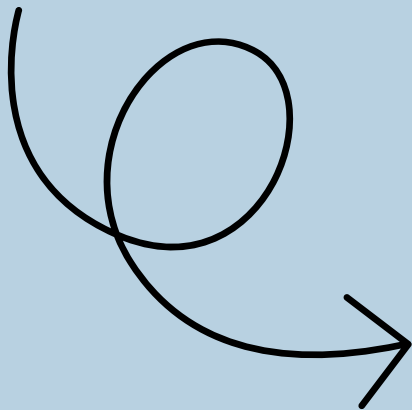
600 years to build it, but in the end a true architectural gem! From the 13th, 17th, 18th, and 19th centuries, Orléans Cathedral bears the imprint of successive royal dynasties, notably the elegance of classicism that gives it its architectural and artistic originality.

Ranking among the five largest Gothic cathedrals in France (140 meters long, 53 meters wide, with a spire rising to 106 meters), Sainte-Croix was begun in 1287 and officially inaugurated on May 8, 1829. It is steeped in a long history: Jeanne d'Arc prayed there, Henry IV initiated its reconstruction in 1601, and Louis XIV funded the transepts, which pay tribute to him by displaying his motto and his sun emblem. The beautifully carved wooden choir stalls and the stained-glass windows recounting the story of Jeanne d'Arc are among its "treasures," along with the 11 richly endowed 13th-century chapels that form its apse.



## 4th step: Sainte-Croix Cathedral

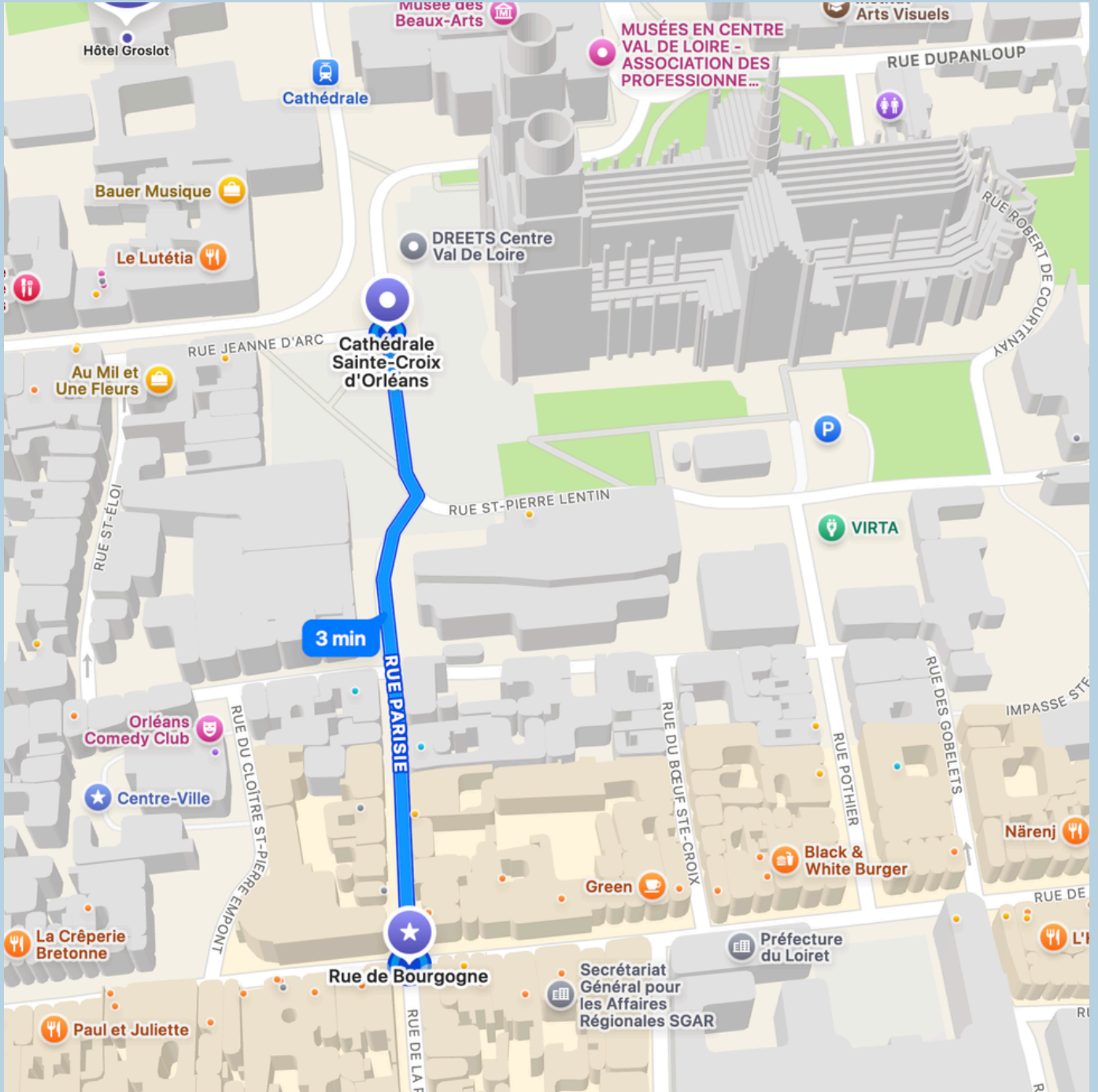
The Cathedral of Sainte-Croix is one of the rare churches—and perhaps the only one in the world—whose pillars do not bear crosses, which traditionally symbolize the consecration of any church. According to tradition, Saint Euverte, Bishop of Orléans in the 4th century, had a vision while celebrating the rite of consecration: he saw the hand of God blessing the cathedral. He then stopped the ceremony, declaring: ‘This cathedral has been blessed by the hand of God; it shall not be blessed by the hand of man!’ The keystone of the apse commemorates this story.



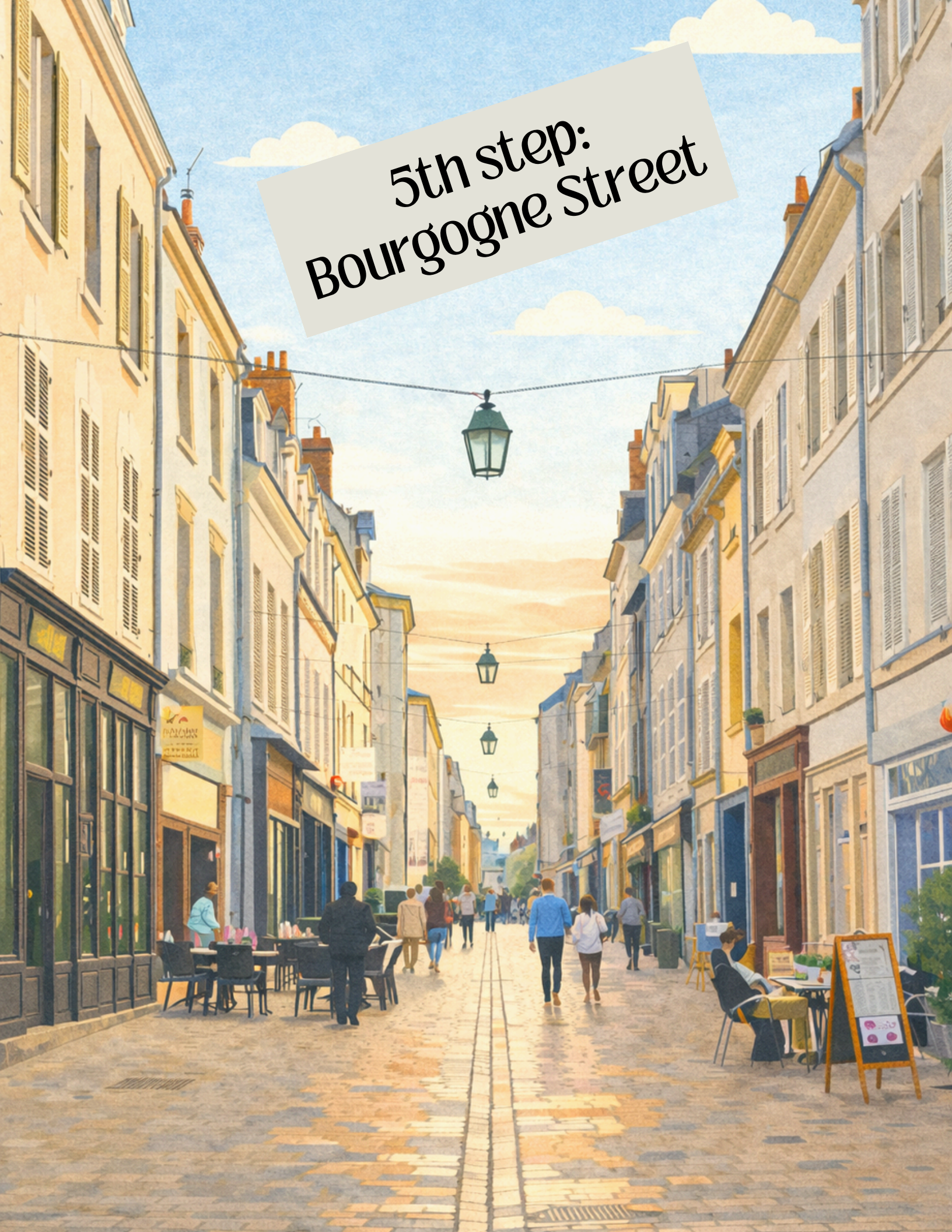

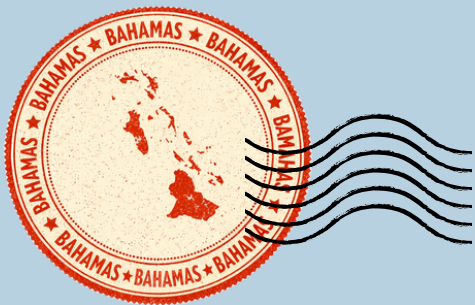


## 5th step: Bourgogne Street

Bourgogne Street has been one of the city's main east-west routes since the Gallo-Roman period. During the Middle Ages, it was the main road leading to Burgundy. It quickly became the city's most commercial street, with the presence of a vinegar factory and a chocolate shop. Over time, the street bore many different names before finally becoming Rue de Bourgogne in the mid-19th century.

A mapping study carried out in 2017 on nightlife streets in France found that Bourgogne Street has the highest concentration of drinking establishments in the city and holds the national record in terms of quantity, with 24 bars.

It is on this street that you can find a great spot to grab a drink with friends!

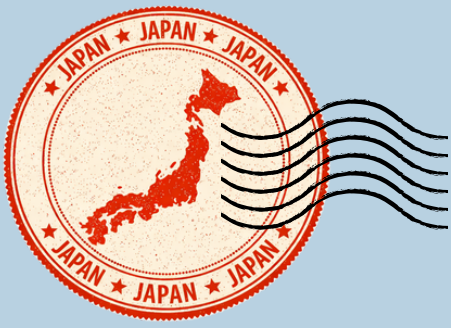

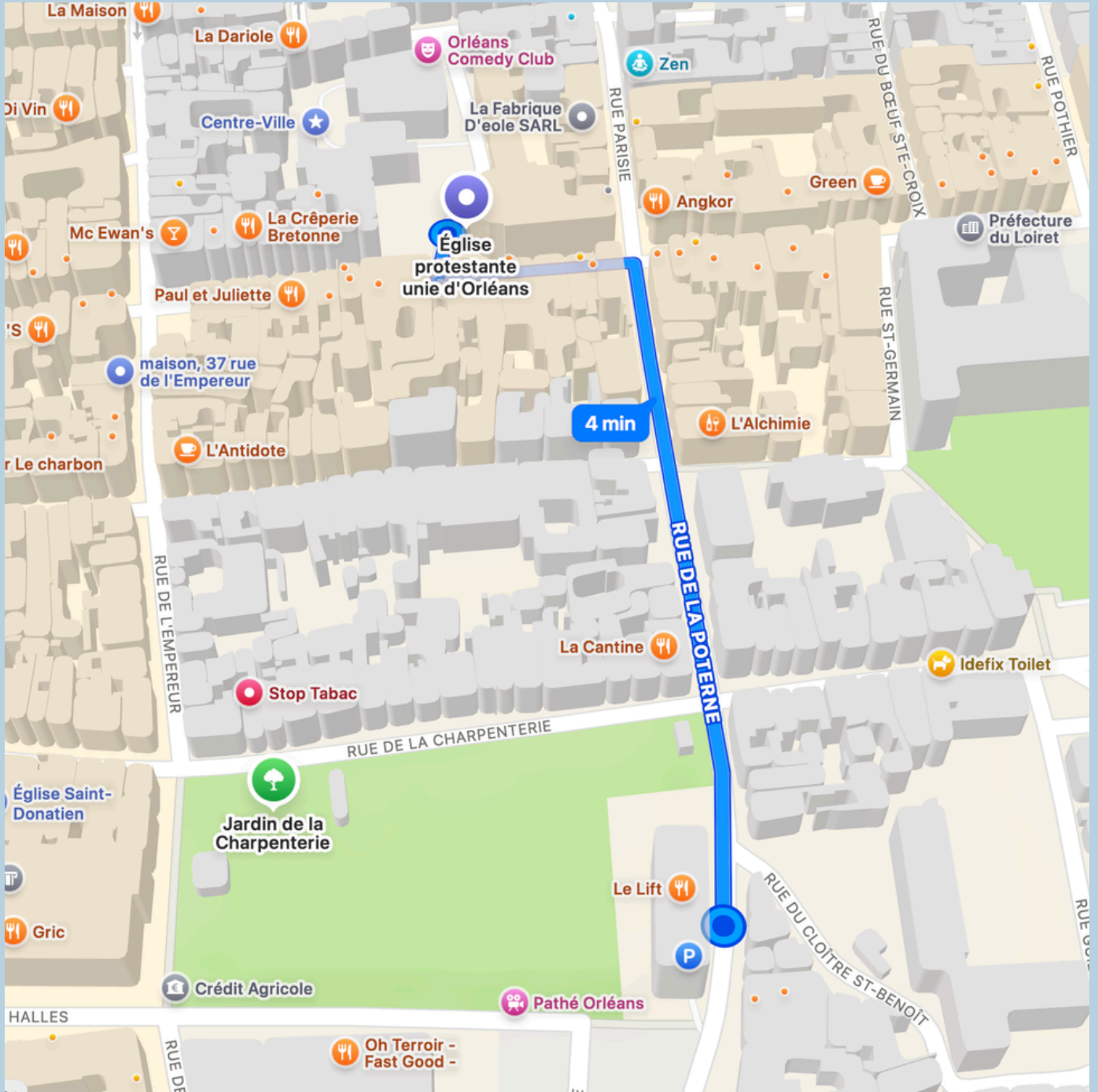
## 6th step: Temple protestant

The temple was born out of a desire to reform Christianity, initiated by theologians such as Martin Luther and John Calvin; Protestantism became structured in France in the mid-16th century.

It was probably inspired by a Roman tomb and was built from the plans of François Narcisse Pagot, the city architect of Orléans, who was deeply influenced by classical culture. The temple's entrance portal features an Ionic pediment surrounded by four columns; the rotunda is crowned with a frieze decorated with radiating medallions and angel masks. It is one of the few round temples in France. Inaugurated in 1839, it was listed in the supplementary inventory of historic monuments in 1969 and has been protected since March 13, 1975.

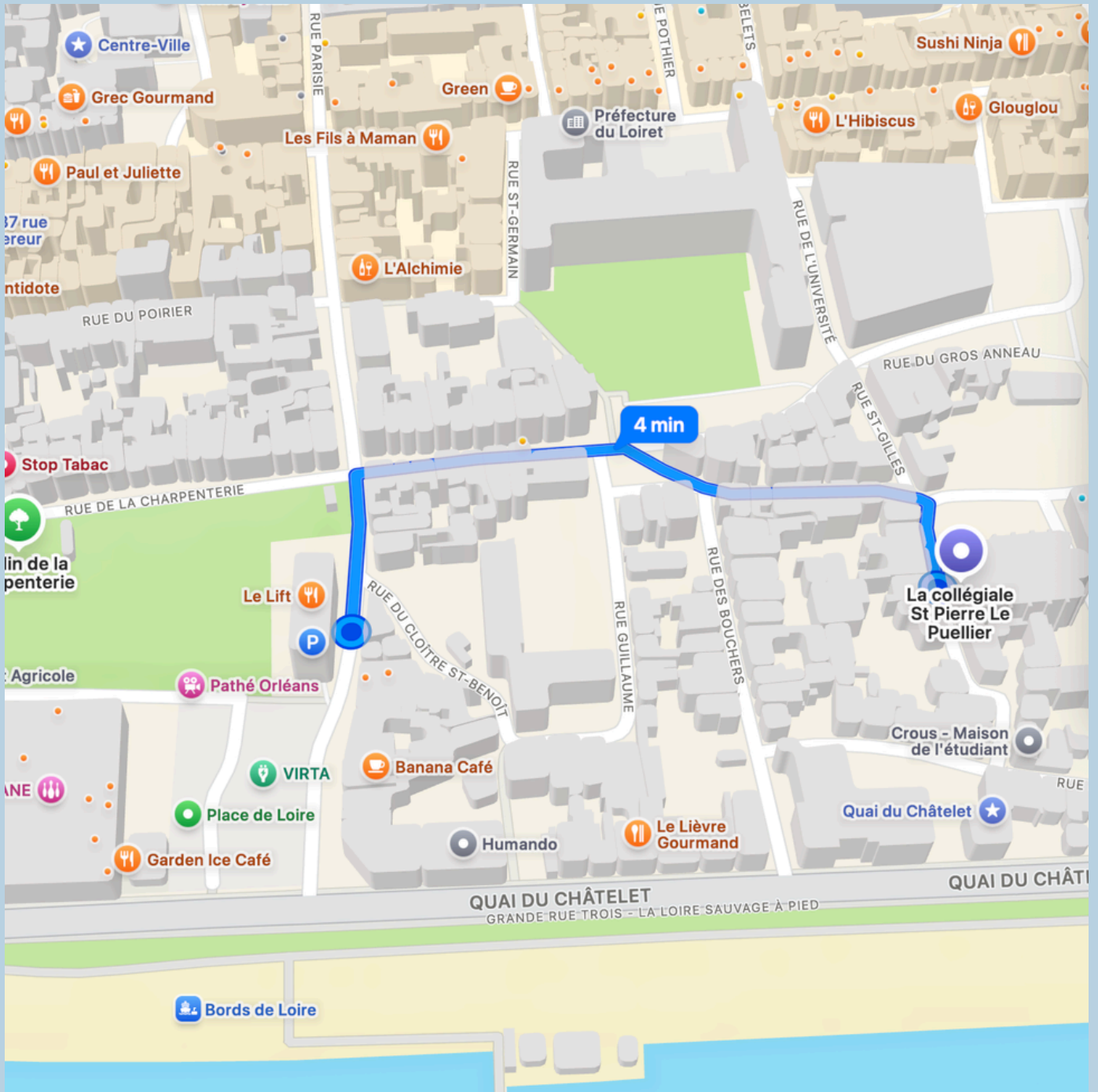
## 7th step: Charpenterie Garden

The Charpenterie Garden was created in 2003 in the heart of the historic center, above the cinema on Place de Loire. This 5,000 m<sup>2</sup> garden offers a true terrace overlooking the Loire landscape. It is organized around a large central lawn bordered by flower beds and a 'wisteria garden,' to which themed gardens are connected.

Designed by landscape architects Alexandra Schmitt and Philippe Niez, it is conceived like a house made up of different rooms. The garden is structured around a lawn bordered by flower beds and wisteria, with enclosed gardens branching off from it. You can enjoy this peaceful stroll in complete tranquility :)

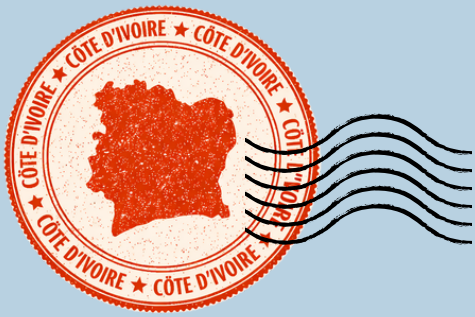


## 8th step: Collegiate Church of Saint-Pierre-le-Puellier

This is the oldest church in Orléans! Partly preserved, it was built from the 12th century onward, and its choir was remodeled in the 13th and 16th centuries. The church was listed as a historic monument on December 11, 2025. It was deconsecrated in 1958 and then renovated between 1966 and 1976. Today, the former collegiate church hosts a space for temporary free exhibitions and concerts.

Among the exhibitions presented in the building are:

- Riberzani, *Mémoires intimes*, 2001
- Jef Aérosol, French stencil artist, 2012
- Jacques Vimard – *Le Voyage vers Cythère*, 2017
- Yseult Digan (*Empress*), 2019

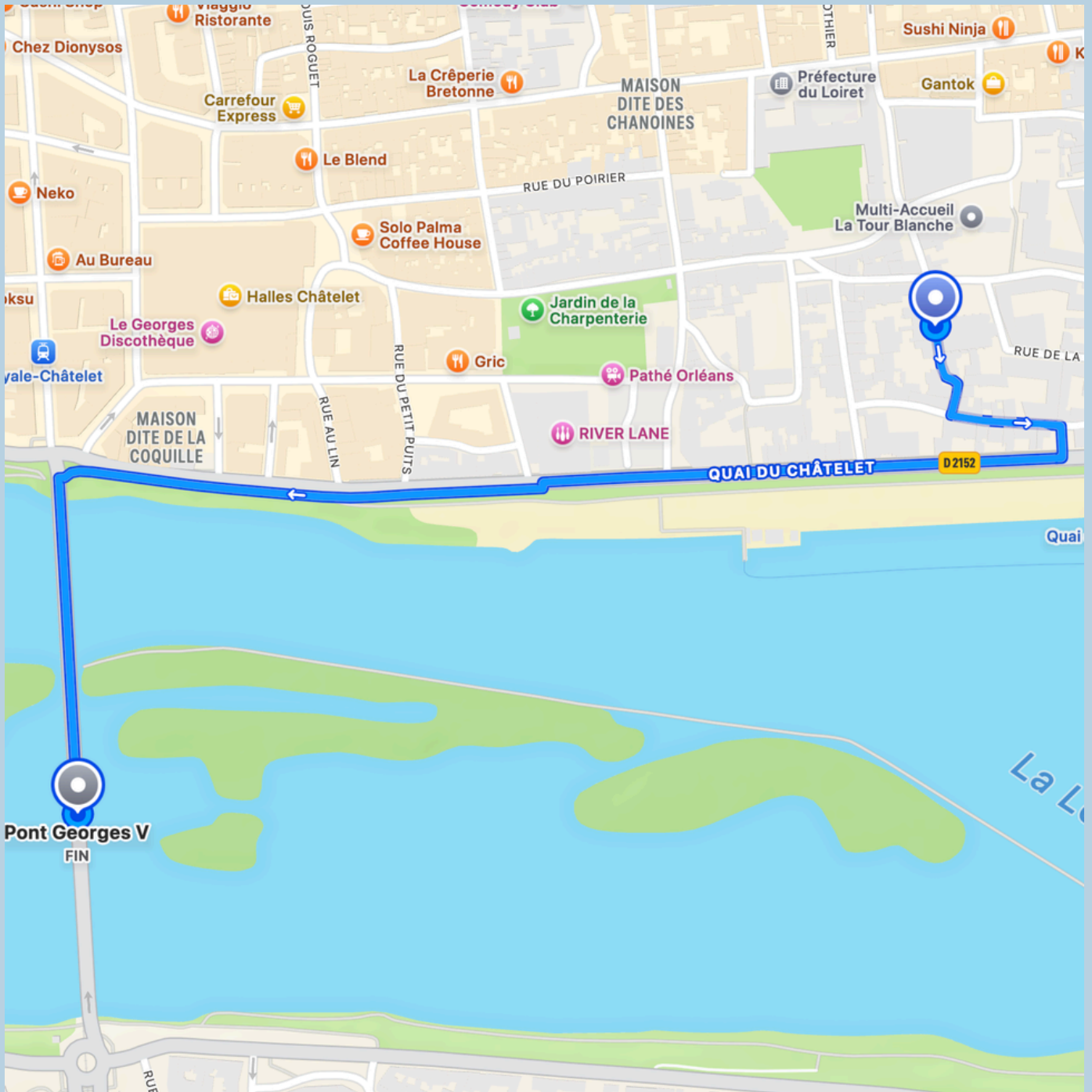
If you are staying in the city center, we suggest stopping by your accommodation to get dressed in your finest attire.

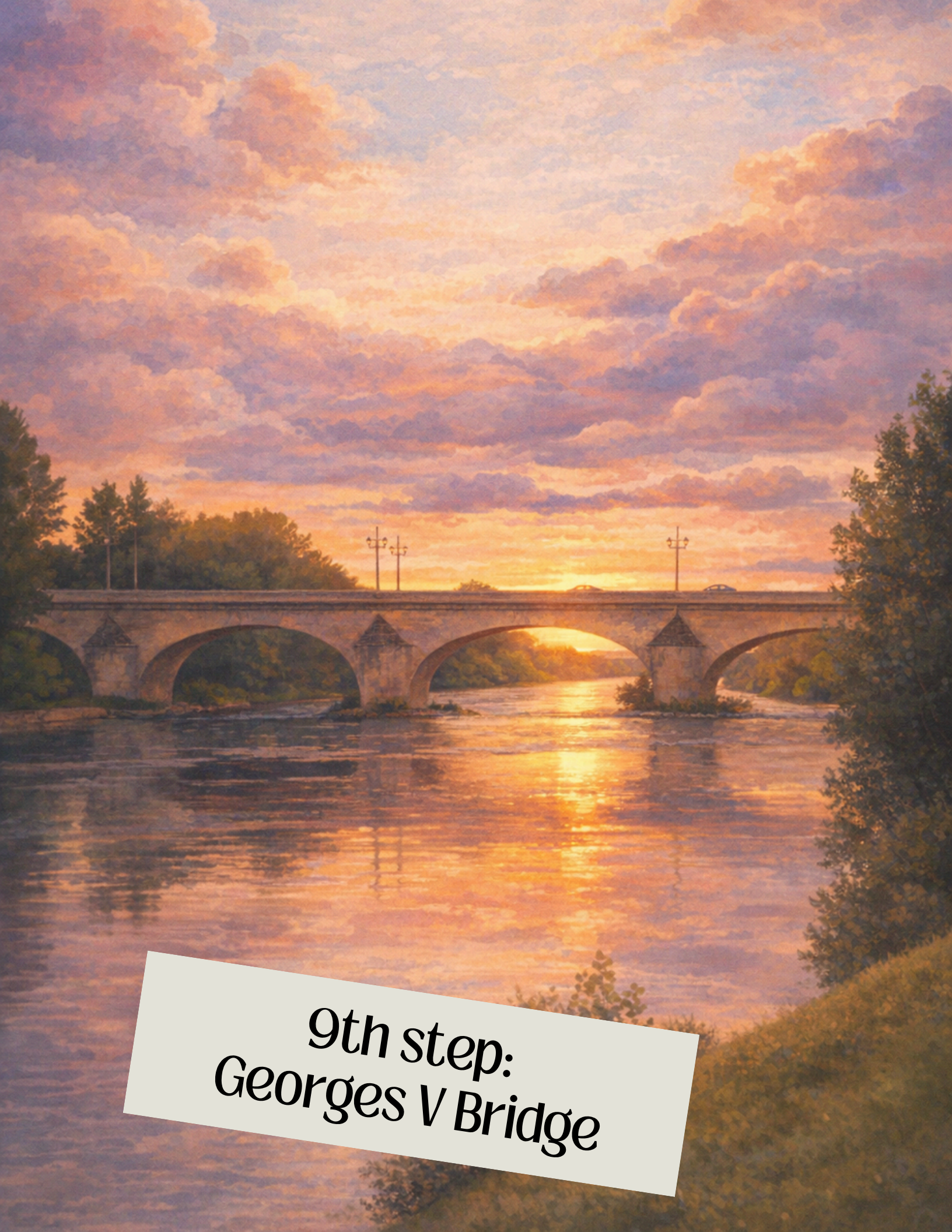
Once you are ready, you can set off again for the next destination: the famous Pont Georges V.



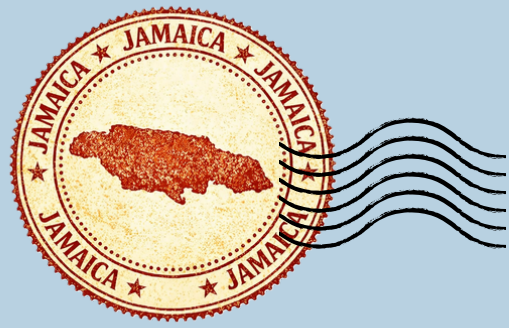

## 9th step: Georges V Bridge

Built in the 18th century, Pont George V, also known as the Royal Bridge, replaced the former medieval Pont des Tourelles.

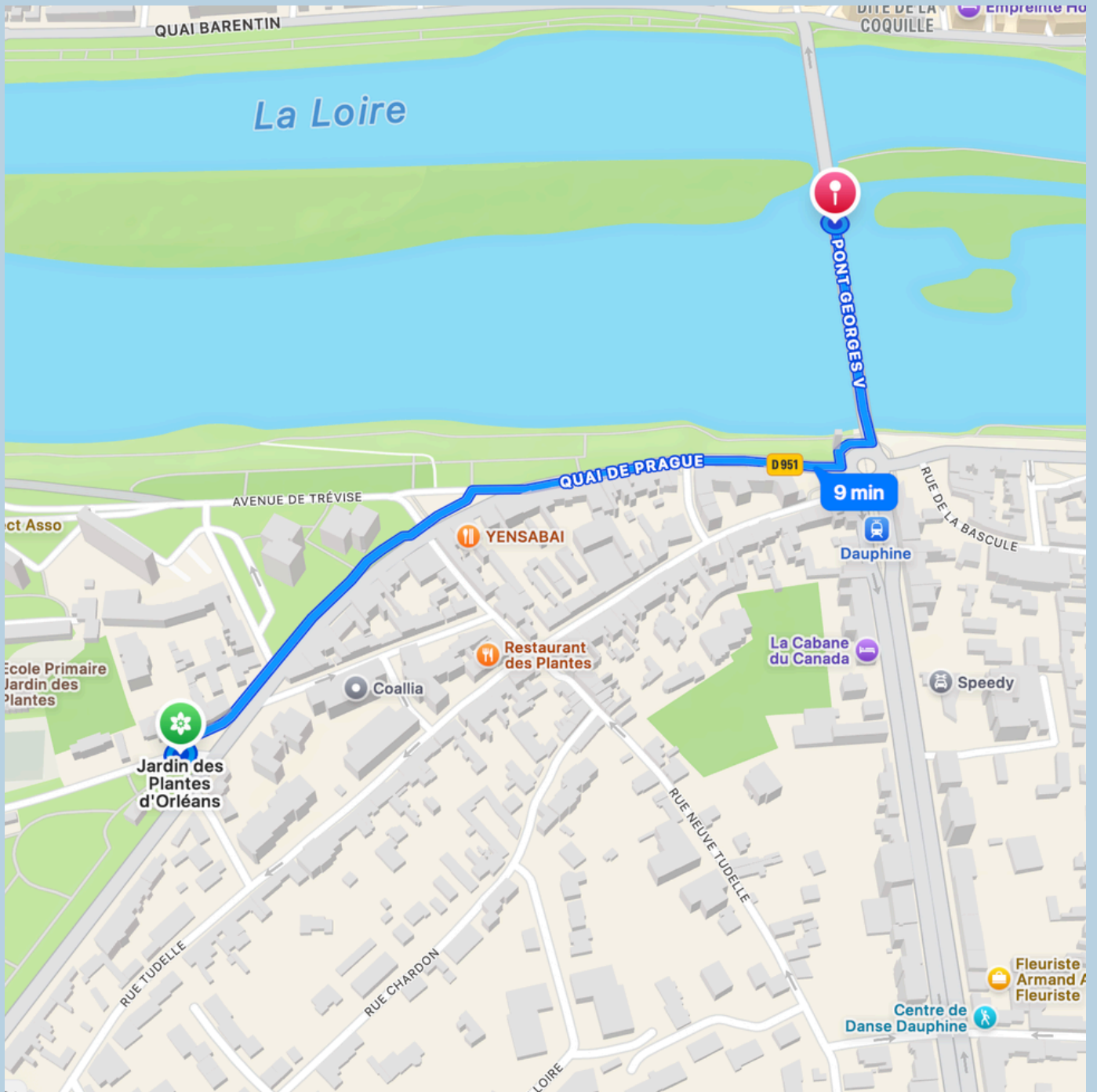
From the very founding of Orléans, crossing the Loire has been a major challenge. The very first bridge, built of wood, was coveted by Julius Caesar, who mentioned it in his Gallic Wars.

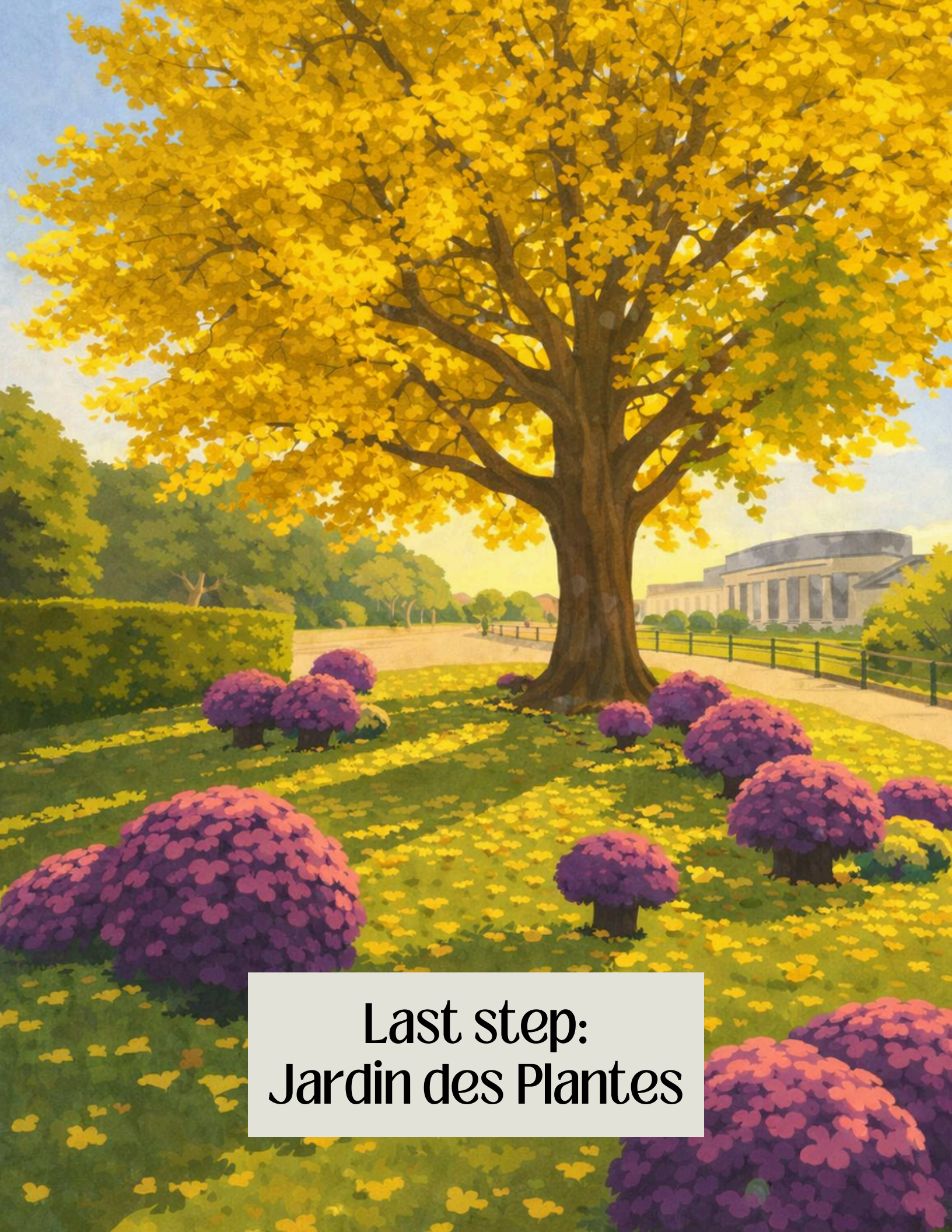
The 12th-century stone bridge of the Tourelles was particularly impressive for its time (330 meters long). It was protected on the south side by the Fort of the Tourelles and on the north side by a fortified gate adjoining the Châtelet (the ducal residence). This bridge was also a place of habitation and trade.

The medieval bridge, which had fallen into ruin by the early 18th century, was rebuilt between 1748 and 1763. In 1914, it was named Pont Georges V in honor of the Allies.

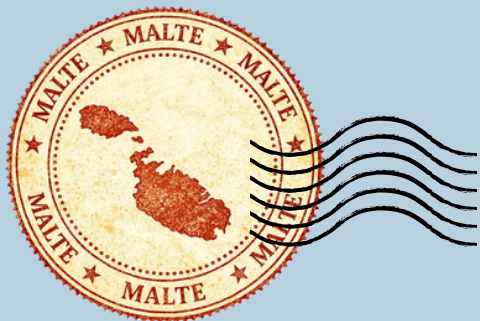

## Last step: Jardin des Plantes

The Jardin des Plantes is the final stop on this tour and also the venue for the conference gala.

In 1640, on the right bank of the Loire, east of the present-day Pont Joffre, the Society of Apothecaries created a botanical garden to cultivate medicinal plants. In 1834, the garden was moved to its current location. It became a place for acclimatizing rare plants brought from exotic lands by boats on the Loire, as well as a site for study and education. The orangery and the heated greenhouses were built during this period.



## Last step: Jardin des Plantes

At the end of the 19th century, the pursuit of floral displays in a landscaped setting took precedence over the scientific study of plants. Today, while the Jardin des Plantes remains an ornamental garden, it is also a place for experimentation and plant discovery. It is here that gardeners test, try out, observe, and assess plants, as well as more environmentally friendly planting and maintenance techniques.

It is one of the tools of sustainable development and continues into the 21st century the missions begun in the 17th century.
